Jim Friend Toastmasters meets on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of every month at Metuchen Borough Hall, Second floor, from 7:00 – 8:00 p.m.

How many members do you currently have?

We are growing at about 18-20 members.

Can you tell me a little bit about your club's achievements?

Our main achievement is that we have been chartered for 5 years. Our club was formed in 2005 as the Brooklynites, which was named after the restaurant in Edison where you used to meet. Each year, this event is hosted by a different District 83 Pharmaceutical Company and is a chance for Toastmasters in the same industry to meet each other. With over 60 guests in attendance representing 13 area companies, (an impressive turnout for any Toastmasters meeting), it was an excellent opportunity to learn how other clubs are run and how Novartis Toastmasters shapes up by comparison.

The evening started off with a Meet and Greet where Toastmasters mingled over appetizers in one of Novartis' newly renovated cafeterias. This was followed by a buffet dinner where everyone got a chance to sit down and relax with new friends and colleagues. The evening was capped off with a fantastic Toastmasters meeting in an auditorium just steps from the cafeteria. Novartis Toastmasters meetings are generally held in conference rooms so this was a treat for us.

Equally impressive was the number of people who volunteered to take on roles for the meeting. We had representatives from GlaxoSmithKline, Roche, Forest Labs, Bristol-Myers Squibb, Merck, Pfizer, Sanofi-Aventis, Morristown Toastmasters, and Novartis who secured a role for the evening, while others from Becton Dickinson, Johnson and Johnson, and Novo Nordisk were wait listed in case someone dropped out at the last minute.

The theme of the meeting was Public Speaking Humor, and the Toastmaster, Joanne Callahan, kept the laughter going by using humorous public speaking quotes throughout the hour. Our Joke Master, William Markert, started off the meeting with an amusing anecdote, followed by the word of the day, Bespoke, presented by our Word Master, Greg Geib.

Our speakers included Brian Lin, former District 83 Governor who presented speech #10, Naresh Chennamsetty who presented speech #9 and Tom Meyer who also presented speech #9, all from the Competent Communicator manual. Our Table Topics Master, Neal Collins, asked people to talk about a memorable vacation and some very humorous responses were received. Evaluators Paula Markert, Baruch Sheinson and Mark Grebenau gave informative and constructive speech evaluations using the sandwich method endorsed by Toastmasters International. Our Timer Japun Bhavsar did a great job of keeping track of everyone's time. Our Grammarian, Sharon Tu, gave a very comprehensive report by pointing out grammatical errors regarding sentence structure, rather than the usual run down of how many 'um's' and 'ah's' slipped out during the meeting. Nina Fleishman stepped in as Ballot Counter at the last minute as our scheduled Ballot Counter had failed to attend, and the votes were quickly and efficiently tallied. Tom Meyer won the Best Speaker ribbon, while Mark Grebenau won for both Best Evaluator and Best Table Topics Participant. Our General Evaluator, Chandra Patel, gave his report of how the meeting was run and his overall impression of the evening and how everyone performed their roles. This was followed by Lisa Pantano, our Lt. Governor of Education and Training, who encouraged everyone to sign the 'Me, Too' board and committing to a particular goal for the current Toastmasters year.

All Toastmasters were presented with a Novartis tote bag filled with goodies donated from various departments throughout the company. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank my Joint Pharma Planning Committee. The evening would not have run half as smoothly as it did without these folks: David Cheng, Janice Ferraro, Nina Fleishman, Karen Killary and Ken West.
