Interview with Brian Lin **Immediate Past District 83 Governor**

Did you accomplish everything you hoped for during your term as District Governor?

Looking back, we have achieved a lot together as a district in a year. We have completed all core 4 goals set by Toastmasters International. We have completed two successful seasons of trainings and contests. We have two fabulous district conferences. We have received full 10 points for the number of Distinguished Area and the number of leadership awards. We are #35 in the world out of 80+ districts. We are quite successful getting things. We, as a district, have served our members well in 2009-2010.

There were goals I wanted to accomplish but have not. Leading District 83 to be one of the top 10 districts of the world was one and training 70% or more club officers was another. 100+ people showing up at any training or division contest also did not happen.

What was your proudest moment in this role?

When someone walks up to me and tells me that I have made a difference in his/her life, tracing back to

something I said or did a few years ago.

What didn't you accomplish that you wished you had more time to achieve?

Charter another 5-10 clubs!

Our 2009-2010 LGM Karen Seeman, DTM worked tirelessly to help various groups forming new clubs. Under Karen's direction and with the help of members from all over the district, we chartered 12 clubs.

We have a few prospects in the pipeline but we did not enough time to put all the pieces together. Member numbers, paperwork, funding, meeting locations, sponsors & mentor recruitment can all be a challenge.

I always want to foster an on-line community of Toastmasters in the region to share company sponsorship info, club leads, and district management best practices. This has not been done yet due to time spent on other activities.

In the area of education, we were challenged with the number of ACs & CCs for most of the year. Tom So-

mers, LGET, and the division & area governors have made a lot of phone calls and sent a lot of e-mails in the last two months of the fiscal year to ensure members completed their educational goals. We met our educational goals in the last 10 days of the year. I had wished for sooner.

I am puzzled why some members need regular reminders to do things good for themselves. Aren't we all grownups who will eat carrots and spinach without our mothers nagging? Do we forget our dreams and promises when caught in the midst of daily chores and routines?

It will be a great accomplishment for me or any district officers to see that our members diligently work toward their educational goals, pay dues on time, and reap the benefit of the Toastmasters program without much supervision. I would rather see our district officers serve more time as leaders and managers than reminders and dues collectors.

What are you doing with all the spare time you now have?

I don't actually have much spare time. I am a member of 4 Toastmasters clubs. Besides my own club meetings, I help officer trainings and coaching. I stay connected with friends, Toastmasters, and Toastmasters friends via phone, social media and e-mails. I have been working on my photo projects of costume parades and modern belly dance concerts. I have enrolled in a local adult school to learn Spanish. I need to practice violin again. My music hands have been rusty, even though I have been gesturing extensively in my speeches.

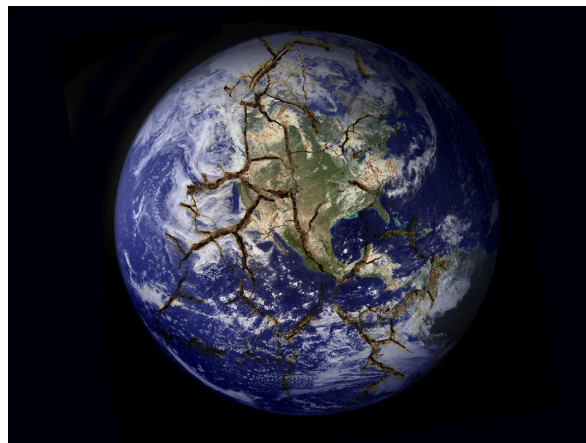
Summary:

Success Story

How long have you been a member of Toastmasters and what is your home club?

I've been an active member for just about 5 years and 1 month. My home club is Tower and Bridge which is a corporate club at Sanofi-Aventis, and we celebrated our 15th anniversary in August.

What made you join Toastmasters in the first place?

I have this issue with my lower lip quivering when I talk to people I don't know. I can feel it but I don't know if anyone else can see it. For years, it drove me nuts and I knew I had to do something. Someone had mentioned Toastmasters to me and since this particular club provided lunch I felt it would not be a waste of my time to attend. I ended up joining this club, but I was not an active member until

I joined Tower and Bridge a few years later.

How has being a member of the club helped you either personally or professionally?

Personally, being a member of Toastmasters has helped create a great network of people that I can contact with questions about anything and many times these conversations do not involve Toastmasters. I've also learned a lot of different things about different cultures since our group is very diverse. Professionally, I had 3 instances where I needed to speak in front of a group and I had positive feedback in all 3 cases. I do find that technical speaking is more difficult than any other type of speech. Motivational speaking and talking about me is easy. But talking about designing a production plan or how to minimize

powder dispersal issues takes public speaking to a different level. Someone can say 'um' 250 times in 20 minutes and this audience will not notice or care, although giving this type of presentation is much easier because of Toastmasters. I am able to use skills and techniques I've learned over the years.

What are your goals as Lt Governor Education and Training?

What I'd like to see are individuals within the clubs setting and achieving goals. If individual members are not achieving their goals, they will not be happy and will not stick around. If the members are not happy then the clubs are not happy. If the clubs are not happy the areas don't get distinguished. What we need to do is make sure those people and are get-

ting what they need in order to succeed.

As a district, what we are doing besides areas visits is the 'Me Too' board and doing significant follow-up. If someone commits to getting an award, we are going to contact them to help them achieve their goals. If a club does not show interest, the individual can lose their motivation to continue. If we can show interest in their progress, then they will stay motivated to succeed. My goal is to let the membership know we are interested in their success.

If the members are involved and the clubs are involved with the members, then they have no choice but to be successful. It will take a lot of work but it may be as simple as letting these individuals know that we care about them, too.

Commitment shy guests need to be educated about the benefits of joining Toastmasters. The VP of Education may want to take a few minutes before the end of each meeting to go over the benefits of a Toastmaster membership, focusing on the positive aspects of increased communication skills as well as the chance to network with like-minded people. Once guests realize that membership will help them in their personal as well as professional lives, they may be more willing to join. Also, if your club has a mentoring program, explain that a mentor will be assigned to all new members to help guide them through their icebreaker speech and beyond.
