Technology changes at an astounding rate and it can be difficult to keep up with the latest trends in communication. To Twitter or Not to Twitter by Joel Heffner, ACB

Twitter (<http://www.twitter.com>) is one of the most popular social networking sites. Articles about it appear in the New York Times and Wall Street Journal. Oprah and Larry King talk about it regularly. Does it have a place for Toastmasters? Surprisingly, the answer is yes.

For those not familiar with Twitter, it's very simple. Anyone can join and it's free. Once you join, you can submit posts, or Tweets as they call them. Each Tweet can be no more than 140 characters at a time. You can submit as many or as few Tweets as you'd like. People who want to see your Tweets are called followers. If you want to follow someone else, you can. Some people, especially celebrities like Oprah have hundreds of thousands of followers. Most people have less than one hundred followers. Like Toastmasters, Twitter is on a world-wide scale. You may find that you are following or are followed by people from all over the world.

Toastmasters can use Twitter in three basic ways. Clubs can disseminate information to members. For example, you can remind members of your meetings. This is especially useful for

clubs that don't have their own Web sites. Another way Twitter helps Toastmasters is that you can get some good advice from people such as Andrew Dlugan (Toastmaster and noted public speaking blogger) and 2001 World Speaking Champion Darren LaCroix, to name a couple of speaking experts you can find on Twitter. Twitter is also a place where you can ask questions on public speaking, help others with their fear of public speaking, and network with other Toastmasters and clubs. If you look up Toastmasters on Twitter, you'll find clubs from London to Brooklyn as well as districts from the east to the west coast.

Twitter is an emerging media that can be helpful to districts, clubs, and individual Toastmasters.

I attended the Executive Board Meetings, and presented several ideas to market the club within our company. During my term as VPPR, I hosted a Newsletter, did several club promotions at lunch hour in front of the cafeteria, and distributed flyers to potentially new members.

In 2007 I competed in the Speech Contest for my club with my tenth speech from the CC manual. I represented my club at the Area Contest, and came in second. It was a very exciting experience for me. The same summer of 2007, I became an Area Governor. I had 5 clubs that I was responsible for. It was quite a challenge! I visited other clubs that were both Cor-

porate and Community based. It was quite a different world out there! I had support from my Division Governor, and LGET, both of whom were very helpful.

The speeches that I gave during my club visits were instrumental in being able to complete my speech requirements for the Successful Club Series, and the Better Speaker Series. I continued to give speeches at my home club, and completed my 2nd CL. ACB, and ACS by the end of my term.

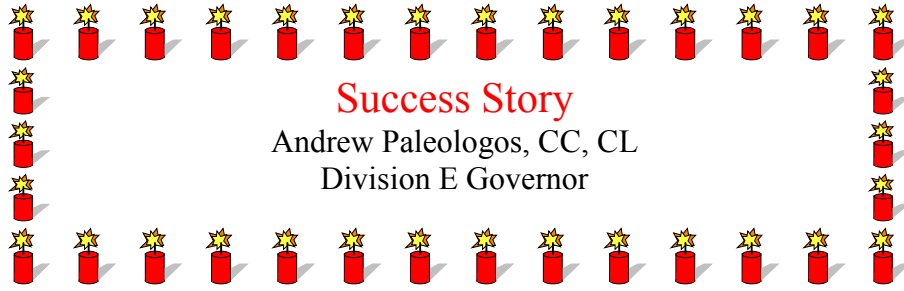
