E-mail Etiquette for Toastmasters

Although the Web gets most of the attention on the Internet, email gets the most action. Millions of pieces of email are sent each day. Unfortunately, many who send email are not aware of the basic etiquette involved. Here are some basic guidelines when sending email.

1. Do not send mass email to folks who don't want to receive it. That's called spamming and is probably the single-most hated thing on the Internet.

2. DO NOT USE ALL CAPITAL LETTERS! On the Internet, that is considered shouting. It's also harder to read all capital letters.

3. Keep your messages short. Email is considered to be much less formal

than sending a letter. Get to the point.

4. Use the Subject line to let folks know what the message is about. Try to make it interesting and short. If you do not have a subject line, many people will automatically ignore your message.

5. Spell check your email. Since your message is a reflection of your image, it is oftentimes the first (and often only) way that you can make a good impression.

6. When sending messages to more than one person, use blind copies (BCC). That means that the other folks who receive your message do not see the email address of each person you are sending the message to. It also will avoid the possibility of one person returning a message to all the other people who

received the original email. It is very annoying to get an email response with something like, "Good idea."

7. When in doubt, do not send it. Frivolous messages should be avoided. No one wants to waste time looking at messages that did not have to be sent. It may also mean that the next time you send a message - it won't even get opened!


8. Make your email address easy to remember. An address like johndoe@consultant.com is much easier to remember than one like jh123094@myworld.net. You can get email addresses at sites such as Gmail <http://www.gmail.com> for free. Creating dedicated email addresses is also a good idea. You can have several different addresses forwarded to your one main

email account. Check with your email provider to see if forwarding is possible.

9. Nice emails are always appreciated. Saying thank you is always a nice thing to do whether you are using email, telephone, or a written note.

Knowing about email etiquette will help you avoid mistakes on the Internet and will make you look more professional as a speaker.

Success Story

Paul Thompson, DTM

I've been in the public speaking field for over 40 years as a public speaker, a corporate trainer and financial planner. I am now the CEO of my own company Thompson and Thompson, Inc. One of the main reasons I joined Toastmasters was to give back to people because I used to be an avid stutterer and it was other people who helped me overcome that. Reading many books on confidence is what inspired me to go forward, and I was even paid \$20,000 for an hour of public speaking to a group of 1800 at a national convention for Nestle Corporation. This was a great honor for me, and like achieving my DTM, this memory will never leave me.

When I heard about Toastmasters I joined to give back and help other people and to "keep my pencil sharp." The 3 years prior to my joining Toastmasters I had not been in the public speaking circuit because I was division governor for three years ago and then I stepped away. I started to wonder if I could do it again, and even if you have been a professional speaker you can have self doubts about your ability speak in front of a group and you find the lack of confidence you had experienced long ago creeping back into your life. I still have little qualms about speaking in public so I know I still need to be out there.

I am a goal oriented person and that is what helped me achieve my DTM and I did it by visiting over 48

clubs across the country in about 4 years. Because I was a corporate trainer at that point, I was able to stop into meetings wherever I was. It was a great thrill for me because there is nothing like meeting other people across the country and I had a lot of fun doing so.

Having success in business is great but after that your self esteem starts to waiver and I felt very good when I achieved my DTM. This goal was worth the effort and I still have the plaque I received hanging on the wall of my office. It is a good conversation piece and both Toastmasters and non-Toastmasters alike will comment on it

Paul is very active in the VFW (Veterans of Foreign Wars), the American Legion and the Marine Corp League. Paul does a lot of work with veterans and is currently an officer in all three of these organizations. Paul is the father of four, he has been married for 41 years (to the same woman!), and has 9 grandchildren with number 10 on the way. Paul is also the author of a book called "For My Grandchild" and has sold 6,000 copies without doing any marketing, merely by word of mouth.
